LETTER TO GOV. NOT STRONG ENOUGH FOR SE NEW MEXICO

Jal, New Mexico- State Senator Gregg Fulfer (R-Jal) said he did not sign the letter to the governor regarding migrants seeking asylum and displacing New Mexicans at Expo New Mexico because he said the letter did not go far enough. He said it did not fully express his and many of his constituents' strong feelings about the matter. Senator Fulfer said he does not want New Mexicans displaced at the fairgrounds and he does not want New Mexicans negatively impacted throughout the state because of illegal immigration.

“This illegal immigration is creating a crisis for us,” Senator Fulfer said today. “The governor apparently is not seeing what we are seeing in Southeastern New Mexico, we are in a crisis. The illegal immigration is severely impacting our students’ education, our healthcare system and things are not safe. Our border communities are feeling that every day. I prefer all the illegal immigrants go directly to Santa Fe, don’t stop in any of our communities, go directly to the capital city so our Governor can see first- hand that there is a crisis. I want the governor to see all the issues up close- issues of possible diseases being spread; issues of illegal drugs; and the issues surrounding all of the manpower that is demanded to handle this influx. I am concerned that the crowds of illegal immigrants are crowding out New Mexicans.”

Dear Governor Lujan Grisham:

We are writing to express concerns about the decision to use Expo New Mexico dormitories for the temporary housing of migrants seeking asylum in the United States. While we are not opposed to the use of Expo New Mexico facilities to temporarily house asylum seekers, we find it problematic that programs that benefit New Mexico's residents and communities may be canceled or relocated because of this decision.

Initial news reporting on this issue indicated that no events scheduled to be held at the state fairgrounds would be impacted by the housing of asylum seekers at Expo New Mexico. We have now learned, however, that the annual 4-H Horse School, which has a long, 30-year tradition of being held at the state fairgrounds in Albuquerque, is being relocated to Las Cruces to accommodate the hosting of asylum seekers at the fairgrounds. This last-minute move of the 4-H Horse School has greatly disappointed the students who look forward to going to the "big city" and the beautiful fairgrounds and has created a hardship on New Mexico families participating in that event.

It is concerning that programs that benefit New Mexico's youth may be disrupted in favor of housing migrant families at the state fairgrounds. Expo New Mexico has ample other facilities and grounds that could be used to house asylum seekers without impacting the long-scheduled 4-H event. We are further concerned that the 4-H event will not be the last event scheduled to take place at Expo New Mexico that will be negatively impacted.

We question whether other events held at Expo New Mexico that are integral to New Mexico's communities, such as the New Mexico State Fair in September, will be adversely affected by this decision, and we seek your assurances that they will not. We are also requesting that the decision to use the dormitories be reevaluated and that the asylum seekers be given temporary housing that does not adversely affect New Mexico youth.

We thank you for your attention to our concerns and look forward to your reply so that we and our constituents will have a better understanding of what to expect at our treasured Expo New Mexico this busy summer and fall season.


