Cabresto Lake: Fishing for brook trout was good when using beadhead nymph flies.

Cimarron River: Streamflow near Cimarron Monday morning was 18 cubic feet per second (cfs). Fishing for trout was good when using yellow Stimulator dry flies, San Juan Worm flies and live worms. Fishing for trout at Gravel Pit Lakes was fair when using marshmallows, worms, Salmon Peach PowerBait and Yellow PowerBait.

Clayton Lake: Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using nightcrawler worms and chicken liver.

Conchas Lake: Fishing for bass was good when using white crankbaits.

Costilla Creek: Fishing for trout was good when using ant-pattern flies and Prince Nymph flies.

Cowles Ponds: Fishing for trout was fair when using dry flies in the evening.

Coyote Creek: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using black dry flies and nymph flies.

Pecos River: Streamflow near Pecos Monday morning was 24 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using silver Panther Martin spinners.

Red River: Streamflow below the Red River Hatchery on Monday morning was 56 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using worms and dry-dropper fly setups.

Rio Grande: Streamflow below the Taos Junction Bridge on Monday morning was 252 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using black Woolly Bugger flies, white Streamer flies and beadhead nymph flies. Fishing for pike was fair to good when using white Streamer flies.

Rio Hondo: Streamflow near Valdez Monday morning was 14 cfs.

Rio Mora: Streamflow near Terrero Monday morning was 7 cfs.

Rio Pueblo: Streamflow near Peñasco Monday morning was 9 cfs.

Santa Cruz Reservoir: The lake is open from 6:30 a.m.-8 p.m., Thursday-Sunday.

Shuree Ponds: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using ant-pattern flies and Prince Nymph flies.

Springer Lake: Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using nightcrawler worms and chicken liver.

Storrie Lake: Fishing for catfish was good when using nightcrawler worms.

Ute Lake: Fishing for walleye was slow to fair when trolling. Fishing for white bass was fair when trolling in 25-35 feet of water in the Canadian River arm of the lake. Fishing for bass was slow to fair when using Berkley MaxScent Hit Worms on drop-shot rigs. Fishing for crappie was fair to good when using live minnows at night under lights. Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using chicken liver and cut bait. The main lake water surface temperature was in the low 70 F range and the water was clear.

Navajo Lake: Fishing for kokanee salmon was slow to fair when using silver spinners, green spinners, pink spinners and orange squid tipped with corn fished 65-75 feet deep. Fishing for smallmouth bass was fair to good when using Z-Man 3.5-inch plastic worms, chartreuse curly-tail grubs and watermelon-green tube jigs. Fishing for pike was good when using pink/silver crankbaits, purple/blue crankbaits and shad-pattern crankbaits.

Rio Chama: Streamflow below El Vado Lake Monday morning was 90 cfs; streamflow below Abiquiu Lake Monday morning was 1,190 cfs. <u>Please remember, from the river-crossing bridge on U.S. Highway 84 at Abiquiu upstream 7 miles to the base of Abiquiu Dam is special trout waters with a bag limit of two trout only.</u>

Rio Grande: Fishing for catfish was good when using chicken liver near Albuquerque.

Riverside Park Pond (Aztec Pond #1): We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Gregorio Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Juan River: Streamflow near Archuleta Monday morning was 811 cfs. On Wednesday, Sept. 27, at 4 a.m., the Bureau of Reclamation will decrease the release from Navajo Reservoir from 800 cfs to 550 cfs. Fishing for trout in the quality waters was good when using Baetis flies and grey midge emerger-pattern flies.

Tips, Tricks and Stories – Kokanee Salmon Snagging Season Starts Next Week

This year at Navajo Lake, the average size kokanee salmon we caught was noticeably larger than ones caught the past several years. Quite a few of the fish we caught this year were in the 18-inch range, which is pretty good for New Mexico salmon. As kokanee salmon prepare to spawn in the coming weeks anglers should know about the special snagging season for these fish. I'll share a picture of some of the fish we caught this year for reference. Below that will be kokanee salmon snagging season information.

Kokanee are land-locked sockeye salmon. Although not native to the Southwest, kokanee thrive in some of New Mexico's deeper and colder, plankton-producing lakes. In late fall, large schools of four-year-old kokanee gather to spawn and die.

A popular method for catching kokanee is snagging – the intentional taking of fish by hooking the body rather than the mouth. Kokanee are the only fish that may be legally snagged, and only during the Special Kokanee Salmon Snagging Season. If another species is caught by snagging, it must be immediately returned to the water.

Each autumn NMDGF collects and fertilizes millions of kokanee eggs. The young hatchlings, called fry, are used to stock Heron Lake, Navajo Lake, El Vado Lake and Eagle Nest Lake. The success of these collection operations is essential to maintain vibrant and healthy fisheries for anglers to enjoy. As a result, Heron Lake, Willow Creek and designated no-wake areas at Navajo Lake are closed Oct. 1-Nov. 12, and no kokanee salmon may be in possession while fishing during these closures at Heron Lake and Willow Creek.

Snagging Season Dates by Location

Oct. 1–Dec. 31: Open at Abiquiu Lake, Rio Chama (El Vado Lake to west boundary of Rio Chama Wildlife and Fishing Area), Navajo Lake (excluding buoyed no-wake areas and shoreline within the no-wake areas at the Pine River Boat Ramp and Simms Boat Ramp), Pine River, El Vado Lake and Eagle Nest Lake.

Oct. 1–Nov. 12: Closed at Heron Lake, Willow Creek and Navajo Lake (buoyed no-wake areas). **Nov. 13–Dec. 31:** Open at Heron Lake, Willow Creek and Navajo Lake.

Bag Limit (during Special Kokanee Salmon Snagging Season) kokanee salmon – 12 per day – 24 in possession
