
2023-24 Fishing RIBs and Licenses Available Online!

Pecos River: Streamflow near Pecos Monday morning was 27 cubic feet per second (cfs). Fishing for trout was fair when using small, bead-head nymph flies.

Red River: Streamflow below the Red River Hatchery on Monday morning was 38 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using Rapala lures, prince nymph flies, and yellow Panther Martin spinners near the hatchery.

Rio Grande: Streamflow below the Taos Junction Bridge on Monday morning was 370 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using rainbow trout-pattern Streamer flies, bright-colored Streamer flies and white Streamer flies. Fishing for pike was fair to good when using green, size-6 Panther Martin spinners.

Rio Hondo: Streamflow near Valdez Monday morning was not measured due to ice.

Rio Mora: Streamflow near Terrero Monday morning was not measured due to ice.

Rio Pueblo: Streamflow near Peñasco Monday morning was 9 cfs.

Santa Cruz Reservoir: Closed for the season.

Shuree Ponds: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Storrie Lake: Fishing for trout was good when using worms.

Riverside Park Pond (Aztec Pond #1): Fishing for trout was slow. Fishing for catfish was slow to fair when using spoons.

San Gregorio Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Juan River: Streamflow near Archuleta Monday morning was 320 cfs. Fishing for trout in the quality waters was fair to good when using black Streamer flies, midge emerger-pattern flies and Griffith's Gnat dry flies. Fishing for trout in the bait waters was fair to good when using worms.

Tiger Park Reservoir: Fishing for trout was very good when using wax worms with a Carolina Rig.

Tips, Tricks and Stories – Northern New Mexico Fishing Update

I wanted to share some info from the last two weeks. I fished Cabresto Lake on Nov. 24 with a friend visiting from Texas. There was barely 20 feet of unfrozen shoreline, and it looked like it would be totally unfishable soon (I've included a picture). Despite the ice, we each caught multiple brook trout, with many males in spawning colors.



The Rio Grande Gorge has been fishing great for two weeks. The tail end of the brown trout spawn has had larger brown trout aggressively hitting streamer flies – even really colorful, flashy ones.

Alex's friend Owen Phillips from Southlake, Texas, caught his first northern pike on Nov. 24 in the Rio Grande Gorge using a green, #6 Panther Martin spinner. He saw a larger pike swipe at his lure once as well.

The Red River near the hatchery had active rainbows, 10-14 inches long, hitting just about anything. We caught some trout on Prince Nymph flies under an indicator and yellow Panther Martin spinners. My friend Owen caught his first brown trout there on Nov. 24 at the hatchery as well, also on a yellow Panther Martin spinner.

Santa Cruz Lake is closed for the winter (we tried to go last Thursday, which was supposed to be the final day but they closed it early for the snowstorm).

My wife and I are headed to the Pecos today to see what it looks like. We will keep you posted!
