Cabresto Lake: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Prince Nymph flies.

Charette Lakes: Fishing for trout was good when using Peach Glitter PowerBait.

Cimarron River: Streamflow near Cimarron Monday morning was 20 cubic feet per second (cfs).

Clayton Lake: Fishing for trout was fair when using PowerBait. Fishing for catfish was fair when using chicken liver and nightcrawler worms.

Conchas Lake: Fishing for smallmouth bass was fair to good when using Senko Worms and crankbaits. Fishing for walleye was fair when trolling using silver Rapala lures, nightcrawler worm harness-spinner rigs and Flicker Shad lures. Fishing for crappie was fair when using live minnows and small crankbaits.

Costilla Creek: Fishing for trout was fair when using bead-head nymph flies.

Cowles Ponds: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Coyote Creek: Fishing for trout was good when using gold Hare's Ear nymph flies.

Lake Maloya: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using silver spoons and Salmon Peach PowerBait. The ADA dock is open to anglers, with priority given to mobility-impaired persons.

Pecos River: Streamflow near Pecos Monday morning was 129 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using orange-and-yellow Stonefly flies.

Red River: Streamflow below the Red River Hatchery on Monday morning was 110 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair to good when using salmon eggs.

Rio Grande: Streamflow below the Taos Junction Bridge on Monday morning was 1,310 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair when using gold spinners and nightcrawler worms.

Rio Hondo: Streamflow near Valdez Monday morning was 55 cfs.

Rio Mora: Streamflow near Terrero Monday morning was 21 cfs.

Rio Pueblo: Streamflow near Peñasco Monday morning was 37 cfs.

Santa Cruz Reservoir: Fishing for trout was fair when using PowerBait. The lake is open from 6:30 a.m. to 8 p.m., Thursday-Sunday.

Shuree Ponds: Opened to fishing July 1. Fishing for trout was fair using small jigs.

Springer Lake: Fishing for catfish at night was fair to good when using chicken liver.

Storrie Lake: Fishing for trout was good when using olive leech-pattern flies, Rainbow PowerBait and Garlic PowerBait.

Stubblefield Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Ute Lake: Fishing for walleye was fair when using bottom-bouncer nightcrawler harness rigs, jigs tipped with nightcrawler worms and jigs tipped with Gulp minnows in 10-20 feet of water. Fishing for white bass was good when using swimbaits, casting spoons and shallow-running crankbaits. Fishing for crappie was slow. Fishing for catfish was fair when using punch bait. Fishing for bass was fair when using Senko worms in shallow water and with drop-shot rigs in 10-15 feet of water on lake points. The main lake water surface temperature was in the mid-70 F range and the water was cloudy.

Fishing for trout near the town of Chama was good when using streamer flies, leech-pattern flies, pink Squirmy Wormy flies, and egg-pattern flies. Fishing for trout below Abiquiu Lake was slow to fair when using bead-head nymph flies. <u>Please</u> remember, from the river-crossing bridge on U.S. Highway 84 at Abiquiu upstream 7 miles to the base of Abiquiu Dam is special trout waters with a bag limit of two trout only.

Rio Grande: Fishing for catfish was good when using nightcrawler worms.

Riverside Park Pond (Aztec Pond #1): We had no reports from anglers this week.

Tips, Tricks and Stories – Pike Fishing Navajo Lake

My name is Matt Gladstone, and I am a 49-year-old angler from Taos. We recently spent a week fishing for pike and bass at Navajo lake. My fishing partner and I experienced slow to fair fishing

for both bass and pike while fishing amongst the rocks and submerged trees in Boncos and Andy's canyon. We were using orange-and-gold, 5/8-ounce Pike Pounder (homemade) spinnerbaits.



My fish was caught on Tuesday, June 20 at 1:20 p.m., approximately 1-mile into Boncos canyon in 15 feet of water. It is about a 32-inch pike weighing 8 pounds, 8 ounces. The fish was successfully caught and released!

We have been fishing in those waters annually for the last few years and a few tips that have been working time and time again is the use of the bright color pattern "Firetiger." Most all of the fish we find are in 3-15 feet of water with the best fishing being on main lake points. We look for blue-green colored water with at least 5 feet of visibility. The pike seem to track the lure better under those conditions, which allows them the opportunity to strike the lure. Large Rattle Shad lures, medium-diving crankbaits and bright spinnerbaits with oversized Colorado blades bring in big fish. They often follow the lure but then turn and disappear at the boat, and it is important to remember to stop reeling in line and do a figure-eight with your lure in the water at the boat's edge because that can trigger a strike also.

My personal best on that body of water is 16-pounds, 6-ounces and was caught in 2021. That was an amazing experience!
