Cabresto Lake: Fishing for brook and cutthroat trout was good when using olive Caddis flies, orange Stimulator flies and Blue-dun Spinner flies.

Charette Lakes: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Garlic PowerBait.

Cimarron River: Streamflow near Cimarron Monday morning was 41 cubic feet per second (cfs). Fishing for trout was good when using Stimulator dry flies, Hare's-Ear Nymph flies, worms, black Creek Bugz and yellow salmon eggs. Fishing for trout at Gravel Pit Lakes was fair to good when using Yellow Garlic PowerBait, worms and salmon eggs.

Clayton Lake: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using various PowerBaits. Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using chicken liver.

Conchas Lake: Fishing for catfish was good when using fresh cut bait.

Costilla Creek: Fishing for trout was fair when using Hopper dry flies.

Cowles Ponds: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Coyote Creek: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Lake Maloya: Fishing for trout was slow to fair. The ADA dock is open to anglers, with priority given to mobility-impaired persons.

Los Pinos River: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Maxwell Lake 13: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Monastery Lake: Fishing for trout was fair when using worms. Benedictine Monastery Lake is part of the Department's <u>Open Gate Program</u>. Please <u>visit our website for more information about this property</u>.

Morphy Lake: Fishing for trout was fair when using Salmon Peach PowerBait and salmon eggs.

Pecos River: Streamflow near Pecos Monday morning was 55 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using bead-head Prince Nymph flies, salmon eggs and worms.

Red River: Streamflow below the Red River Hatchery on Monday morning was 56 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using dry-dropper fly setups.

Rio Grande: Streamflow below the Taos Junction Bridge on Monday morning was 322 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Streamer flies and bead-head nymph flies.

Rio Hondo: Streamflow near Valdez Monday morning was 21 cfs.

Rio Mora: Streamflow near Terrero Monday morning was 10 cfs.

Rio Pueblo: Streamflow near Peñasco Monday morning was 17 cfs.

Santa Cruz Reservoir: The lake is open from 6:30 a.m.-8 p.m., Thursday-Sunday.

Shuree Ponds: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Parachute Adams dry flies.

Springer Lake: Fishing for catfish at night was fair to good when using chicken liver.

Storrie Lake: Fishing for trout was slow.

Stubblefield Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Ute Lake: Fishing for walleye was slow. Fishing for white bass was good when trolling using crankbaits and jigging using slab spoons in 35-45 feet of water. Fishing for bass was slow when using topwater lures early in the mornings. Fishing for catfish was fair when using chicken liver and nightcrawler worms. Fishing for crappie was slow. The main lake water surface temperature was in the low to mid-80 F range and the water was clear.

Abiquiu Lake: Fishing for all species was slow.

Animas River: Streamflow below Aztec Monday morning was 184 cfs.

Albuquerque Area Drains: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Bluewater Lake: Fishing for tiger muskie was fair when using deep-diving shad-pattern

crankbaits, Rapala lures and hot dogs.

Brazos River: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Canjilon Lakes: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Orange PowerBait and Pistol Pete spinner flies.

Cochiti Lake: Fishing for pike was fair to good when using crankbaits, minnows, nightcrawler worms and cut bait. Fishing for white bass was good when using blue-and-chrome Rat-L-Trap lures; small, white swimbaits and curly-tail grubs. Fishing for largemouth and smallmouth bass was fair when using chartreuse/pearl curly-tail grubs. Fishing for crappie was slow to fair when using minnows and small, gold swimbaits. Fishing for catfish was good when using chicken liver, nightcrawler worms and stink bait.

Fenton Lake: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using nightcrawler worms and PowerBait. For updated lake conditions, visit the park's webpage or call the park office at 575-829-3630.

Grants Riverwalk Pond: Fishing for bluegill was fair to good when using worms.

Heron Lake: Fishing for trout was fair when using orange Rapala lures.

Jemez Waters: Streamflow near Jemez Monday morning was 11 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair when using Mayfly flies and Panther Martin spinners.

Laguna del Campo: Fishing for trout was slow.

Lagunitas Lakes: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Lake Farmington: Fishing for bass was good when using crayfish.

Liam Knight Pond: Fishing for catfish was fair when using bluegill.

McGaffey Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Navajo Lake: Fishing for kokanee salmon was slow to fair when using silver spinners, pink spinners and orange squid tipped with corn. Fishing for smallmouth bass was fair to good when using 3-inch plastic worms, chartreuse curly-tail grubs and watermelon, green tube jigs. Fishing for pike was fair when trolling using deep-diving crankbaits.

Rio Chama: Streamflow below El Vado Lake Monday morning was 494 cfs; streamflow below Abiquiu Lake Monday morning was 271 cfs. <u>Please remember, from the river-crossing bridge on U.S. Highway 84 at Abiquiu upstream 7 miles to the base of Abiquiu Dam is special trout waters with a bag limit of two trout only.</u>

Rio Grande: Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using nightcrawler worms and chicken liver near Albuquerque.

Riverside Park Pond (Aztec Pond #1): We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Gregorio Lake: We had no reports from anglers this week.

San Juan River: Streamflow near Archuleta Monday morning was 692 cfs. Fishing for trout in the quality waters was good when using Red Annelid flies and Foam-wing Emerger flies. Fishing for trout in the bait fishing waters was fair when using live worms.

Seven Springs Brood Pond: Fishing for trout was fair when using flies and peach PowerBait.

Tiger Park Reservoir: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Greene Acres Lake: Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using earthworms and cut bait.

Jal Lake: Fishing for catfish was fair when using nightcrawler worms.

Lake Van: Fishing for catfish was fair to good when using chicken-liver-flavored Magic Bait.

Tips, Tricks and Stories – Know Your Depth and Distance to Catch More Fish

Adding a line-counter reel to your fishing arsenal can help keep you in the fish's strike zone. This can be a great technique to use for catching schooling or suspended fish such as walleye, white bass, trout and kokanee salmon. A line-counter reel tells you exactly how many feet of fishing line you have extended. Knowing how much line you have extended can help you understand how deep you are fishing and how far your line extends behind your boat.

When trolling, the amount of fishing line you extend from the reel impacts your lure depth. Typically, the more line you release or extend, the deeper your diving lures are able to dive. Fish can be boat-shy, so dialing in the distance behind the boat where fish are comfortable eating can also be very helpful.

You start by letting out 40 or 50 feet of line. If you are not getting bites at that distance, you can release more line—10 feet for example. You can continue testing different distances until you find the "sweet spot" where the fish are biting. Once you identify the right distance of line to use, replicating a specific presentation is easy using a line-counter reel. After catching a fish, simply release line from your reel to the exact distance the previous fish was caught.

Line-counter reels are an essential tool for many avid anglers that like to troll for fish in New Mexico.

Vertical jigging with a line-counter reel is also a productive technique. For instance, during this past week at Ute Lake, anglers were successfully vertical jigging for white bass in 35-45 feet of water while using slab spoons. Having a line-counter reel enables the angler to eliminate the guesswork and know exactly what depth they are jigging.
