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NMPRC to host first 'Regulation in New Mexico' seminar at the Roundhouse

Two-day event will focus on adapting to changes in regulatory practices across the state

SANTA FE – The New Mexico Public Regulation Commission (NMPRC) is excited to host the agency's first "Regulation in New Mexico – How to Navigate a Dynamic Landscape" seminar on Monday and Tuesday, November 13 and 14, at the State Capitol.

Open to the public, this two-day event will focus on regulatory practices across the state, where new environmental priorities, changing technologies, and developing regional markets have made for a dynamically altering landscape, and is designed to provide crucial updates on utility regulation and administrative law, targeting professionals who are actively involved in these sectors. The seminar is approved by the State Bar of New Mexico for continuing legal education (CLE) courses – 10 general credits and 2 ethics credits; this will be the first time that the NMPRC has hosted an accredited CLE course in more than a decade.

Seminar panels will be led by NMPRC staff, leadership from other state agencies, and industry professionals from the private and nonprofit sectors. The discussions will cover topics related to administrative hearing practice and settlements and include presentations on ethics and professionalism.

Leading off the presentations will be a discussion on the "NMPRC's Role: A Stakeholder's Perspective," moderated by Commissioner Gabriel Aguilera and featuring New Mexico Senate Majority Leader Peter Wirth; Energy, Minerals and Natural Resources Department Secretary Sarah Cottrell Propst; Rikki Seguin, executive director of the Interwest Energy Alliance; and Adrian Rodriguez, president of Southwestern Public Service Company. They will examine the NMPRC's role within the state from the perspectives of legislators, public officials, utilities, and stakeholder representatives, particularly the role the agency can play in New Mexico's economic development and transition to zero carbon resources.

"The 'Regulation in New Mexico – How to Navigate a Dynamic Landscape' seminar will provide a great platform for learning about the continually evolving regulatory environment in our state," said

Commissioner Aguilera. "It's an opportunity to foster a deeper understanding of the regulatory challenges and opportunities that lie ahead for the NMPRC. I'm excited to gain insights from legislators, public officials, utilities, and stakeholder representatives as we explore collaborative opportunities in shaping a brighter future for New Mexico."
