Cimarron River: Streamflow near Cimarron Monday morning was 22 cubic feet per second (cfs). Fishing for trout was fair when using worms and bead-head, mayfly-pattern nymph flies.

Conchas Lake: Fishing for smallmouth bass was good when using bright-colored Flicker Shad lures, white fluke lures and green tube baits. Fishing for walleye was good when using bright-colored Flicker Shad lures and worm-harnesses rigs. Fishing for white bass was good when using bright-colored Flicker Shad lures. Fishing for crappie was fair to good when using bright-colored Flicker Shad lures.

Costilla Creek: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Cowles Ponds: Fishing for trout was good when using salmon eggs.

Coyote Creek: We had no reports from anglers this week.

Eagle Nest Lake: The lake is open to fishing and boating. Fishing for trout was good when using Salmon-Peach PowerBait, and when trolling using Panther Martin spinners, red-and-white Dardevle Spoons and Garlic PowerBait. Fishing for pike was slow to fair when using red-and-white Dardevle spoons and red-and-black Bucktail Streamer flies. Eagle Rock Lake: Fishing for trout using spinners, PowerBait and flies was slow.

Lake Maloya: Fishing for trout was good when using silver spoons. The ADA dock is open to anglers, with priority given to mobility-impaired persons.

Morphy Lake: Fishing for trout was good when using Joel-O-Shotz Red Floating Sweet Hartzy floating bait.

Pecos River: Streamflow near Pecos Monday morning was 246 cfs. Fishing for trout was good when using worms.

Red River: Streamflow below the Red River Hatchery on Monday morning was 99 cfs. Fishing for trout was fair to good when using salmon eggs.

Rio Grande: Streamflow below the Taos Junction Bridge on Monday morning was 1,040 cfs. Fishing for trout was slow to fair when using nymph flies. Anglers reported high water levels and poor visibility due to runoff water from melting snow in the high country.

Rio Hondo: Streamflow near Valdez Monday morning was 69 cfs.

Rio Mora: Streamflow near Terrero Monday morning was 68 cfs.

Rio Pueblo: Streamflow near Peñasco Monday morning was 66 cfs.

Santa Cruz Reservoir: Fishing for trout was fair to good when using Pistol Pete spinner flies

and PowerBait.

Shuree Ponds: Closed until July 1.

Springer Lake: Fishing for all species was slow.

Storrie Lake: Fishing for trout was fair when using worms and Garlic PowerBait.

Stubblefield Lake: Fishing for all species was slow.

Ute Lake: Fishing for walleye was good when using spinners, crankbaits and Berkley Gulp Minnows in shallow water. Fishing for white bass was good when trolling and casting crankbaits and spinners in shallow water. Fishing for bass was good when using wacky-rigged worms, Ned rigs, swimbaits, and square-billed crankbaits. Fishing for crappie was good when using live minnows and small jigs. Fishing for catfish was very good when using punch bait in the upper Canadian River arm of the lake. The main lake's water surface temperature was in the mid-60 F range, and the water's color was clear.

Tips, Tricks and Stories – "Green Shelled" But Still a Win

If you've played the popular video game Mario Kart, you've likely heard someone yell, "I've been green shelled!" as their kart spins out from a hit. This past Saturday, a green shell was met with amusement and joy when a fisherman, expecting to see a fish on the end of his line, was surprised to find a turtle instead.

This scene played out at Isleta Lakes during an adaptive fishing adventure organized for children with disabilities by local nonprofits GO Unlimited and Adelante with fishing lessons from New Mexico Game and Fish. Wheelchair users of all ages were welcomed along with their families and friends.

This event was designed to show how the outdoors can be more accessible with the right equipment. Adelante's Destination Accessibility program offered demonstrations of the FreeWheel, a wheelchair attachment that makes navigating uneven terrain easier. GO Unlimited also brought their inventory of adventurous, adaptive equipment for attendees to try.

There were fishing lessons, lots of poles in the water, and smiles all around, but perhaps not enough action for Eliza, a fifth-grader with a wheelchair covered in butterfly clips, who has fished with sea lions in Puget Sound. While there were no sea lions on this outing, Eliza still had a good time and the opportunity to try out a FreeWheel, which helped her navigate the area more easily at Isleta Lakes. Next month, she'll undergo her 28th surgery, but on Saturday she got to just be a kid enjoying the sunshine, fishing, eating lunch and spending time with her brother and father.


